

Last week we celebrated the Feast of the Ascension, the day when Jesus returned to be with His Father in heaven, the readings from last Sunday follow on from this event. Teacher Profile – Dr Kay Job title – Teacher of Religious Education

This is my first year as a school teacher, although I come from an academic background. The son of university lecturers based here in Oxford, I took my first degree in Divinity from Edinburgh University, and went on to study for a Masters, followed by a PhD, in Medieval History from the University of St Andrews.

Having enjoyed tutoring undergraduates, I listened to my heart, and set out to pass on to young people the spirit of inquiry and critical thinking that was an inspiration to me among the many educators from whom I have had the opportunity to learn.

From the first point of contact, I knew St Greg's was the right place for me to do this. Every day I am taken back by the support and encouragement of colleagues in my department, and the care and commitment of others throughout the school. As a teacher of Religious Education it is heartening to be part of a community that takes spiritual growth seriously, and I know this is a source of hope for our future. In sometimes trying circumstances, the school has a wealth of assets: talented staff, exceptional facilities, a strong ethos, and, most importantly, students who are full to overflowing with passion, curiosity and potential.

This year has not always been plain sailing. As I watch students entering the exam hall this week, I think about ways I could have improved my lessons with them, but I also feel privileged to be part of this community, which is doing all it can to help them give a good account of themselves.

When I take a break, you can usually find my tending the allotment. Its peace and parsnips!

Uniform

It's great to see students arriving each day looking smart and ready for school in their navy blue St Gregory's uniform. Thanks to parents and carers for supporting our new uniform. Can I please ask that all students wear appropriate coats to school. Hoodies are not part of the school uniform and if an extra layer is needed under blazers only the official school jumpers are allowed to be worn.

If you are thinking of purchasing new footwear for school, please buy black leather school shoes not trainers. Trainers are only worn for PE lessons.

Remember that students not in correct uniform will be sent home to change, or will work in isolation from other students. We also have a ready supply of second hand uniform which we can provide on a temporary basis if necessary. If your child arrives out of uniform, her/his Head of Year will follow this up with you.
